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Siding With Scutari, Judge Rules For Open Voting Process For Union County Convention

Judge Katherine Dupuis ruled in favor of an open voting process for tonight's chairman's convention, a victory for Scutari Insider NJ Poll: Who Will Win the Chairmanship of the Union County Democratic Committee?

As the Union County Democratic Committee heads into tonight's convention, who will prevail: Nick Scutari or Colleen Mahr?



NEWS FROM INSIDER NJ



Tonight, the Union County Democratic Committee will hold their chair's convention after a bruising month of political and legal battles between Senator Scutari and Acting Chair Mayor Mahr to succeed Assemblyman Jerry Green as top leader of the county party. Yesterday, a judge ruled that the convention must use an open process to tabulate the votes, and candidate Anthony Salters dropped out and endorsed Mahr late last night (read more in the Diner Booth below).

In what was a <u>politically difficult decision</u>, Assemblyman Anthony Bucco <u>dropped his exploratory bid</u> for the CD11 seat, <u>endorsing</u> Jay Webber at the same time, saying 'Jay can and will run the kind of campaign necessary to keep this seat in Republican hands, and ultimately, protect taxpayers from a liberal, big-government approach under Nancy Pelosi.' Webber <u>welcomed</u> Bucco's endorsement.

Governor Murphy <u>announced three new Cabinet picks</u>: Zakiya Smith Ellis as Commissioner of the Department of Higher Education, Deirdre Webster Cobb as CEO of the Civic Service Commission, and <u>Sue Fulton</u> as Motor Vehicle Commissioner. Garden State Equality <u>released a statement</u> praising the choice

of Fulton, who is the first high level LGBT member of the Governor's Cabinet.

Governor Murphy <u>announced a coordinated effort</u> between the state, the Legislature, and law enforcement agencies to improve school safety in the wake of the Parkland shooting.

HALT PennEast, a group of homeowners, filed a <u>request for a rehearing</u> of FERC's approval of the PennEast pipeline because the approval would allow PennEast to exercise eminent domain over private and preserved land.

ONE American <u>released a statement</u> urging Senator Booker and Rep. Frelinghuysen, both members of foreign affairs committees, to protect foreign aid programs.

Chairman John Currie announced veteran operative Axel Owen to <u>serve as political</u> <u>director</u> of the State Dems; Owen successfully managed the winning LD11 Democrats' campaign last year.

The Union County Democrats <u>will have an open</u> <u>voting process</u> for their convention tonight,
Judge Katherine Dupuis <u>ruled</u> yesterday,
banning the use of voting machines and
allowing a hand-raised vote. Having <u>heard</u>

arguments on all sides during the morning, Judge Dupuis pulled the attorneys into her chambers in an attempt to mediate an outcome, given the tight timing runway to tonight's vote. She eventually ruled in favor of Scutari's legal team's argument. Scutari attorney Kologi said he expects an appeal by Mahr's attorney, Bill Northgrave, this morning. Allies of Scutari, who had advocated for the open process, had filed the complaint in Superior Court against Mahr, who wanted a closed process with voting machines. Scutari's legal team yesterday also requested Union Clerk Rajoppi review five Union Township committee seat

vacancies that <u>they say weren't vacant</u>, <u>presenting affidavits</u> signed by the committee members, who insist they never resigned from the seats.

While the <u>court ruling</u> is a victory for Scutari, Mahr also scored a victory with the <u>endorsement</u> of Hillside Democratic Chair Anthony Salters, who <u>dropped</u> <u>out</u> of the chair's race late last night and <u>threw his support</u> to Mahr, saying that he has '<u>absolutely nothing negative</u> to say at all about Senator Scutari personally' but that as a Senator, as Judiciary Committee chair, and as Linden Democratic municipal chairman, Scutari would wield too much unchecked power if he ascends to the county chairmanship saying '<u>it could be a politically dangerous situation</u>.'

Mahr <u>heads into the convention tonight</u> with the voting bloc controlled by Senator Cryan (about 100) in Union Township, Fanwood (but for Freeholder Al Mirabella, who's with Scutari), Salters' votes out of Hillside (19-20 votes), and key suburban support to offset the advantages Scutari has in the cities; Scutari <u>heads into the convention tonight</u> starting with 125 odd votes in Elizabeth, the bulk of Linden, Rahway and however many votes in Plainfield that Adrian Mapp can deliver.
