Supporters Rally For NJ 12th District GOP Candidate Daryl Kipnis At Trump National Golf Club

BEDMINSTER, NJ - Supporters of Republican 12th District Congressional Candidate Daryl Kipnis packed the banquet hall at Trump National Golf Club Wednesday night as the race to unseat two-term Democratic incumbent Rep. Bonnie Watson Coleman heats up.

GOP dignitaries from across the state joined the crowd to cheer on the Franklin Township attorney, including New Jersey Republican State Committee Chairman Doug Steinhardt and America Winning Coalition President and Donald J. Trump for President 2020 Advisory Board member Steven Rogers.

"Daryl epitomises all the things that so many of us hold dear," Steinhardt said. "We want to live safely and securely in homes we can afford, in a state we can afford to live in. He stands for those same values that so many of us cherish. We need people like Daryl in the U.S. House of Representatives to protect our interests and our families."

Steinhardt said the state GOP is working hard across the state to help candidates at all levels by spreading the party's message to the people.

According to Steinhardt, the GOP has registered about 25,000 new members since he took office in January, and his staff has logged in more than 20,000 miles crisscrossing the state and attending more than 100 GOP events to rebuild, rebrand and re-engage the party.

"The results, so far, have been extremely positive," he said. "People are disillusioned with what is going on in Trenton. They see the turmoil there and know that they have to do better."

Rogers said the stakes in the 2018 midterm elections are "very, very high" and that Republicans need to turnout in November to preserve the nation's freedoms.

He said that Kipnis will stand up for the ideals of the party and President Trump regarding the second amendment and constitutional rule of law.

"We need a congressman like him that will stand up tall and determined to support the Constitution of the United States as rule of law in this country," he said. "Not the (activist) courts (and) not the (activist) judges."

Rogers said that while the media may portray the race as "an impossible task," with the help of God and the president's political organization, "nothing is impossible."

In his remarks, Kipnis said he sees what is happening at both the national and state levels and the culture of "resisting" the achievements made by Republicans and the Trump administration.

He said the "world changed" after President Trump's 2016 election.

"We finally have a president who is not a career politician, who was not on a "track," who was not told 'this is your turn," Kipnis said. "We have somebody who came in and told the American people he was here for them, he earned our trust, he earned our admiration, he won, and he started to deliver on his promises."

He said Trump delivered by growing the national GDP to 4.1 percent in the second quarter of this year, reducing unemployment, seeing the stock market grow to record levels, and making the economy stronger.

"The engines of America's economy are burning brighter than ever before thanks to President Donald J. Trump and the Republican leadership in congress," he said.

Despite the positive impacts nationwide, Kipnis said New Jersey "is on the (financial) precipice, making many residents leave the state.

"(New Jersey) has a far-left, radical governor because two-thirds of the state stayed home (on election day)," he said. "They have an active culture of resistance in the (Democratically controlled) state government."

He said the state is losing about 18,000 residents each month because of higher taxes and regulatory burdens on businesses.

"No one can afford to live here," he said.

He said that by improving the quality of the state's congressional delegation would help get more federal dollars coming back to New Jersey, instead of being dead last in the return of tax money sent to Washington, D.C.

"I don't want one single New Jerseyan left behind from all the successes of Donald Trump's agenda of 'Make America Great Again,'" he said. "We don't face the Democratic party of JFK, we don't face the Democratic party of FDR, what we are seeing today is a far-left permutation like we haven't seen before."

Kipnis pointed to the Socialist ideas of recent New York Democratic congressional primary winner, Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, and the disruptive calls from other Democrats like Maxine Waters to "push back" on Republicans no matter where they are out in society.

"These are not (the Democrats) we are used to," he said. "This is something else."

Kipnis said there is no "magic" about the 12th District being "blue," but rather more a result of habit and a number of voters simply not going to the polls.

"(Republicans) are the 'big tent' party, we're the party of inclusion," he said. "We are the party that is working for the common American person."
