

WELCOME to the 2024 InsiderNJ Labor List

Worried that it would make Democratic leadership look good in an election year, Donald Trump, the 2024 GOP nominee for president, prevailed on cowardly GOP House members to kill a bipartisan deal for a United States-Mexico border wall, another bullet point in the ongoing evidence of Trump's woeful lack of fitness for office.

Thankfully, the labor movement is poised to play a significant role in this year's presidential election, and Vice President Kamala Harris can run on the considerable labor record of the Biden-Harris Administration. Consider alone the \$461 billion in Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, which funds over 60,000 projects nationwide, among them a \$16 billion dollar, long-delayed Hudson Tunnel connecting New York and New Jersey. Other projects, according to the White House, "range from repaving roads and water system upgrades funded through formula grants to states to competitive funding for massive bridge and transit projects. This map of signature projects is illustrative and is intended to showcase the far-reaching impact of the law from coast to coast." This is good news for Building Trades Labor, where, to paraphrase New Jersey Labor Leader William Mullen, "All we do is build."

AFL-CIO President Liz Shuler continues to highlight Labor's critical role in this year's presidential contest, not-

ing that union workers make up one in five voters in swing states. According to a report by NPR's Suzanne Nuyen, "Keep in mind that nationwide only one in 10 U.S. workers are union members. That statistic suggests a far higher concentration of such workers in states where the election will be decided."

Trying to summon populist nativist fervor on a hateful message, Trump by contrast to Harris has no recourse but to spew mud to distract from his lousy working families record. We know the score only too well in New Jersey. From Mother Jones: "Trump's company encouraged its employees to invest their retirement savings in company stock, according to a class-action lawsuit filed by employees against Trump Hotels & Casino Resorts following its 2004 bankruptcy. Then, when the stock price was near its nadir as bankruptcy loomed, the company forced the employees to sell their stock at a huge loss. More than 400 employees lost a total of more than \$2 million from their retirement accounts, the lawsuit states. The lawsuit was ultimately dismissed when a judge found no illegal actions on the part of Trump's company. But the conflict shows how Trump's exploitation of bankruptcy laws for his personal gain did end up hurting his employees."

Says Donna DeCaprio, President of UNITE Here Local 54 in Atlantic City: "Trump and his supporters would like people to believe that he'll be a good president because he's been a good businessman, but that's just not true. I've been working in Atlantic City for 37 years, and over that that period, Trump owned five casinos. Trump bragged that the city was a 'cash cow' for him, but his Atlantic City casino companies refused to pay bills and Trump businesses claimed bankruptcy four times while he owned and operated casinos in Atlantic City, hurting small businesses and their employees. We don't need that kind of person running the country."

It's important for those swing state workers to understand the stark contrast here, and if New Jersey is to play a role in this historic election, may it tell that brutal cautionary tale about Trump, his pull-out from our state and how it devastated workers, against the backdrop of historic infrastructure investments undertaken by the Harris-Biden Administration, including new train tracks and new tubes at a critical commuter choke point, rising at this very moment by the grace of American Labor.

10. MIKE HELLSTROM


LIUNA Vice President and Eastern Regional Manager

16. STEVE SWEENEY


Gubernatorial Candidate
